Horseman Dennis Reis Promotes a "Day of the Horse"

Acclaimed equine clinician, Dennis Reis, founder of the School of Universal Horsemanship in Penngrove, CA, is urging horsepeople across the United States to sign a resolution to create a "National Observance Day of the Horse."

Reis believes Americans should recognize the importance of the horse in its history, and should be aware that the horse industry contributes \$112 billion annually to the American economy. Secondly, the resolution would promote the welfare of horses, wild and domestic, since they are dependent on humans for adequate food, water and shelter.

Reis has been successful in establishing a "Day of the Horse" in California. Legislation was passed designating the second Saturday in December as the official day.

Reis has devoted his life to the practice of horsemanship and is

dedicated to improving the horse-human relationship through the sharing of age-old horse handling methods and knowledge.
