


A once-in-a-lifetime gathering in Fort Worth paid tribute to one of the most influential horsemen in history.

T'S IMPOSSIBLE to say how many horsemen have been directly or indirectly influenced by Tom Dorrance. The 91-year-old Californian created a revolution in horsemanship by advocating training techniques born out of respect for the horse, and taught his proteges to work with, rather than against, their mounts.

Today, clinicians who have learned either from Dorrance himself or from his students share his natural horsemanship philosophies worldwide, with most adding their own interpretations in the process.

A historic gathering, held Feb. 24-25 in Fort Worth, brought together more than three dozen of these horsemen, including some of the most visible clinicians working today, for a Ray Hunt clinic benefiting Dorrance, who's been struggling with health problems. Buck Brannaman, Craig Cameron, Peter Campbell, Dennis Reis, Larry Mahan, Buster McLaury, Bryan Neubert, and Pat Parelli were just a few of the horsemen who paid \$1,000 per class to travel to

Texas and ride with Hunt.


Approximately 1,000 spectators filled the W.R. Watt Arena at the Will Rogers Memorial Center on each day of the weekend clinic, which featured colt-starting and horsemanship, and included a sold-out banquet and auction, General admission tickets sold for \$50 per day, with banquet attendees paying \$80 per person. Organizers donated all funds raised by the clinic to Tom Dorrance.

Not your typical clinic, the event began with each clinician drawing a number that corresponded with one of four round pens in the arena. Each pen contained eight to ten colts, provided by Hunt, the 6666 Ranch, and the Pitchfork Ranch. From there, each handler progressed at his own pace, haltering a colt and introducing him to the saddle.


Each clinician worked under Hunt's supervision, but with an arena filled with horsemen, each working with a colt, it was up to audience members to select which handlers they'd observe. Hunt and his wife, Carolyn, provided continuous commentary.

Tom Dorrance, who had planned on being in Fort Worth for the event, was unable to attend. Hunt, however, made sure Dorrance was never far from the minds of attendees and participants.








Craig Cameron takes a quick break from a horsemanship session.




Brad Cameron rode a mule in the horsemanship class. The mixture of clinicians' styles, approaches, and philosophies made for a memorable experience.
